Curriculum and Academics

We have been in the final stretch for this year in grades 4-12. We have continued to push hard with our curriculum and in addition have started some targeted review for some of our lower areas.

- Fifth grade has been attending tutoring led by Mrs. Houser, our Title I math tutor.
 She has been located in the downstairs media center and has been doing a great job reviewing fractions with our 5th grade students.
- In addition, 5th grade has had 30 minutes a day of additional math lessons in the
 upstairs media center. Mrs. Jackson, Mrs. Deaton, and myself have been leading this
 review and we have seen some good progress with the students.
- Mrs. Hicks has been assisting in 8th grade English Language Arts each day during her planning and has really been working to improve the 8th grade reading scores.
- All of our teachers are looking for engaging ways to finish the year successfully.
 Mrs. Barger had the Math I students compete in a Math Olympics game.
- Fourth Grade celebrated their iReady growth scores with sno cones and popcorn on Monday, May 3rd. Mrs. Barnes and Mrs. Byars both had 96% growth rate in math and Ms. Gambrell had 86% growth in Reading. I am glad this team is looking for ways to encourage students to stay focused and to promote growth!
- We currently have a couple of seniors in jeopardy of not graduating. The teachers and I have been in constant communication with the seniors and their parents and it will not be a surprise to the families if their student does not graduate. We will continue to monitor the situation.
- Registration for the 2021-2022 school year is almost complete. Students have a very good idea of what their classes will be for next school year. This is the earliest we have been able to complete the registration process and we are excited about this progress. As of today it

looks as though all seniors will be taking at least one CCC course next year as well as the students who are on the path to earning their Associates Degree.

• As of May 10th, it looks as though 14 of our 30 seniors will graduate with their Associates in Science Degree as well as their high school diploma. The Commencement Ceremony will be on Thursday, May 13th at 6:00 at Cleveland Community College. We have several of our seniors that are going to participate in that ceremony and we look forward to celebrating with them.

Professional Development:

Mrs. Richardson and Ms. McGinnis have been working with teachers on renewing or
converting their licenses to teach. Teachers collect their professional development
certificates and upload those to the state for their renewal and/or conversion. Mrs.
Richardson and Ms. McGinnis have done a good job in assisting teachers through this
process and completing the school's portion for each renewal or conversion.

- Ally Hudson, a 9th grader at Pinnacle, was invited and participated in Clemson's C-CAT program from April 30th - May 2nd. Clemson's Challenge for Academically Talented Students (C-CATS) recruits top students from SC, NC and GA to participate in high-powered weekend retreats. Classical Foundations Program (CFP) Update May 11, 2021 Jeff Ziegler

- 1. The Pledge of Allegiance and School Pledge are recited over the loudspeaker daily.
- 2. Using John Allison's Kenneth R. Meyer Lecture, Mrs. Breanne Norman Miller has compiled monthly character lessons based on the school's values statement, along with a schedule for showing video excerpts. The first nine themes were honesty, integrity, reality, reason, independent thought, productivity, teamwork, justice, and self-esteem; in May, the theme is pride.
- 3. Several discussions have taken place with T. K. Coleman of the Foundation for Economic Education about producing videos related to the school's ten values; these videos would replace Mr. Allison's video excerpts in 2021-22. On December 31, Mr. Coleman sent three draft videos for administrative review; one was shown at the January board meeting. Administrators had a strongly positive reaction, and he sent draft videos 4-7 in late March. Videos 8-10 are expected by May 31. Mr. Coleman has been invited to give a motivational talk during the second week of the school year.
- 4. David Bobb (Bill of Rights Institute) and Lily Tang Williams (Victims of Communism Foundation) were scheduled to be our principal lecturers this year. The lectures have been rescheduled for **November 8**, **2021** (Dr. Bobb) and **January 31**, **2022** (Ms. Williams).
- 5. I submitted an article to *Political Economy in the Carolinas* examining public charter school vs. LEA performance in North Carolina for various demographics.
- 6. As discussed in the CFP document approved by the board in March 2020, students in grades 7-12 have submitted essays to national contests, and judging for the local contests is underway.
 - 7. The Classical Foundations Program advisory board will hold its next meeting on

Friday, June 25, at 4:00 PM.

- 8. On April 19, O. Max Gardner III will speak to students in grades 10-12 about the Shelby Dynasty.
 - CFP financial statements, provided by Mrs. Donna Mabry, are included with this report. Updated financial statements will be provided for the PCA board at the May board meeting.
 - Dr. Corey DeAngelis will be our commencement speaker at the May 29 graduation ceremony.

Minutes of November 13, 2020 meeting

The Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program advisory board met virtually on November 13, 2020, at 4:00 P.M. Eastern time. Justin Davis, Matthew Morgen, Thomas Pack, David Raney, Adam C. Smith, Wes Westmoreland, and Jeff Ziegler were in attendance.

Mr. Morgen moved that the agenda be approved, and Mr. Pack seconded the motion. The motion carried unanimously.

Members discussed the minutes of the August 11, 2020, meeting. Dr. Raney suggested a slight change of wording with regard to the speeches suggested in August as an addition to the rhetoric curriculum. With the change accepted, Dr. Smith moved that the minutes be approved, and Mr. Morgen seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

Members received an update on the progress of Pinnacle Classical Academy, including enrollment trends, a testimonial from a 2020 graduate, an update on class of 2021, and an update on Phase 2 of construction. Members also heard an update on the progress of the Classical Foundation Program.

Members then discussed Action Item 1: The "I, Pencil" essay contest:

The Foundation for Economic Education has announced an essay contest based on Leonard Read's "I, Pencil." This year's deadline was November 15, and the essay was open to students in grades 11-12 (though by permission of FEE, it was also open to Pinnacle Classical Academy students in grade 10). Students in Mr. Ziegler's Ethics, Economy and Entrepreneurship class (dual-enrollment, University of Arizona) were assigned the essay and strongly encouraged to submit it. The advisory was asked to consider, with the consent of the school's administration, that the essay become part of the CFP essay program for the following classes: Economics and Personal Finance (all grade 10 students); Ethics, Economy and Entrepreneurship (grade 10-12 elective). This essay would replace the Stossel in the Classroom essay for grade 10.

With Dr. Raney moving that the motion be approved and Dr. Smith seconding, the motion to designate the essay part of the essay program was approved unanimously.

Members then turned to Action Item 2: the proposed John A. Allison IV Award. The draft proposal discussed at the meeting had the following components:

- The proposed John A. Allison IV Award would be awarded annually by the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program (CFP) to a scholar selected by Classical Liberals in the Carolinas (CLC) for distinguished contributions to the mission of CLC and CFP.
- In honor of the award recipient, each year the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations
 Program will designate two students as Pinnacle Classical Academy's CLC Fellows: the top student
 from the Ethics, Economy, and Entrepreneurship course and the top student from the Economics

- and Personal Finance course. The students will be selected by the Faculty Liaison to the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program, in conjunction with the school's Dean of Secondary Education.
- Each CLC Fellow would be awarded a \$500 scholarship upon graduation from Pinnacle Classical
 Academy. In addition, each CLC Fellow will be invited to attend that summer's Classical Liberals in
 the Carolinas conference. Each CLC Fellow who attends the conference will be given a \$250 stipend
 by the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program (CFP) to help defray the cost of
 their (and their families') attendance, travel, and lodging at the conference.

Following discussion of the draft proposal, Mr. Pack moved to allow Mr. Ziegler to work with Dr. Smith in proposing a draft for consideration to the board of CLC and to the board of PCA, with the goal of potential implementation at the 2021 CLC meeting. Mr. Morgen seconded the motion, which was approved unanimously.

The board offered suggestions for teacher recruitment and the 2021 graduation speaker. Following the discussion, the meeting adjourned at approximately 5:00.

Proposed John A. Allison IV Award (second draft)

Following the November 13, 2020, CFP board meeting, and taking into consideration the discussion at the meeting, Mr. Ziegler on November 21 sent to Dr. Adam C. Smith the following second draft of the proposed John A. Allison IV Award for the consideration of the CLC board.

The proposed John A. Allison IV Award would be awarded annually by the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program (CFP) to a scholar selected by Classical Liberals in the Carolinas (CLC) for distinguished contributions to the mission of CLC and CFP.

In honor of the award recipient, each year the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program will designate two students as Pinnacle Classical Academy's CLC Junior Scholars: the top student from the Ethics, Economy, and Entrepreneurship course and the top student from the Economics and Personal Finance course. The students will be selected by the Faculty Liaison to the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program, in conjunction with the school's Dean of Secondary Education.

Each Junior Scholar would be awarded \$500 upon graduation from Pinnacle Classical Academy, whether in the form of scholarship or as a cash award, as determined by the CFP board of directors. In addition, each Junior Scholar will be invited to attend that summer's Classical Liberals in the Carolinas conference. Each Junior Scholar who attends the conference will be given a \$250 stipend by the Pinnacle Classical Academy Classical Foundations Program (CFP) to help defray the cost of their (and their families') attendance, travel, and lodging at the conference.





Curriculum and Academics:

- All students in grades 6-12 were invited back to campus under Plan A on Tuesday, March 30th. With a lot of hard work from our custodial team, teachers and administrative team we moved classrooms that were located in the media centers, art room, music room back to their regular classrooms.
- Our NC Check-In scores for grades 3-8 were disappointing. I am most concerned with math. We believe there are numerous reasons as to why our scores are so low. We are working to fix this between now and the end of the year, but more importantly for next year and the following years.





- This month we will complete iReady assessments for grades 4-8. Third grade must complete their final iReady assessment within a certain window of time for us to use that cut score for the Read to Achieve requirement.
- Also in April, our sophomores will have the opportunity to take the Classic Learning Test 10. This test is being given at no charge to the school this year. This test is similar to the old SAT. It includes analogies and literary passages. This test is associated with multiple scholarships. Fifty students who test will win a \$2,500 scholarship. There are 197 colleges that accept this test for admission. The colleges and scholarships are listed in the documents below. This test will be given on April 28. It is a two hour test.
