- Amy Hastings-84\% of her class was proficient in reading. She will be instrumental next year as we have set the grade level reading goal at $80 \%$.

- Brooke Keling, one of our first year teachers, solidified her class proficiency at 76\%. This is a difference of $13 \%$ higher than the grade level proficiency at $63 \%$.
- 3 out of 5 teachers were higher than the $63 \%$ proficiency level. Anderson, Hastings, and Keling. There will be training and additional support in place for math as we move into the 2021-2022 school year to increase proficiency. We have set our 3rd grade math goal for the new year at $80 \%$. We will need to grow $17 \%$ !
- Currently, we are looking at the following numbers:

- Retention is not taken lightly and several factors are considered before deciding to retain a student. The desired outcome when retaining students is for them to improve their long-term educational performance as they progress through school. The short-term goal of retention is for students to make meaningful progress and gains in the repeated year.
- Several factors are taken into consideration as the retention decision is made; academic deficiency, attendance, maturity, social skills, previous retention, parent support, etc.
- Teachers look at multiple data points (iReady diagnostics, classroom grades, standardized test scores, running records, etc) to help determine whether a student should be retained.
- Parents are alerted early in the school year (sometimes at the first parent/teacher conference) of student deficiencies and sign a document indicating they have been notified that their child is not working on grade level.


## Summer Reading and Math Camps

- 1st-3rd grade students will attend camp at the K-3 campus this year. (We are not in the middle of construction!)
- Dates and times for the camps are: Reading Camp-June 14th-24th (Monday-Thursday, 9:00-12:00) and Math Camp-July 12th-22nd (Monday-Thursday, 9:00-12:00).
- We are asking parents to make the 2 week commitment so that students will be able to receive targeted and individualized support.
- There will be 4 teachers working each camp with one of them leading the campl

## Curriculum and Academics

- All 30 of our seniors graduated on Saturday, May 29th at Pinnacle Classical Academy's Lyceum. We had a very good turnout and both Senior Awards Night and Graduation were nice ceremonies for our PCA families. Fourteen of our 30 seniors will graduate with their Associates in Science Degree as well as their high school diploma. Several of our Pinnacle students, faculty members, and Board members were able to attend the commencement on Thursday, May 13th at 6:00 at Cleveland Community College. We are very proud of our Pinnacle graduates and are excited to see what the future holds for each of them.
- Our testing year for the 2020-2021 school year has concluded. We are using this data to reflect on our instructional methods for the 2021-2022 school year and will use this to help focus and drive instruction.
- The last day of classes for students was Friday, May 28th. We held a virtual awards ceremony for all students in grades 9-11. Email invitations were sent to parents of students receiving awards. The day seemed to go well and the students appeared appreciative. It was a good way to end the year and celebrate student accomplishments. Middle School awards were mailed to students with report cards and 4th and 5th grade teachers had classroom celebrations with students. Next year, our plan will be to host awards in person again. We really want to be able to celebrate all our academic accomplishments to the fullest.
- In order to welcome our Pinnacle families, welcome letters, schedules, and introductions to staff members will be mailed out in July. We will also include information about pick-up, school calendars, arrival and dismissal times. Supply lists will be posted by mid-June on the school's website.
- We have several camps that will be going on this summer to help students retain and reinforce concepts learned throughout the school year. We will be offering a reading camp
and a math camp for students in grades 4-6 at the 4-12 campus. Reading camp will be held from June 14th - June 24th and math camp is from July 12th - July 22nd.
- We have already started the process of assisting the Class of 2022 with their college application process. We are hosting a summer workshop led by Dr. David Parker, head of Parker Educational Consulting. This workshop is designed to give students advice and hands-on workshop time for writing powerful college application essays, and writing the most effective and concise activities and honors sections for their college applications. Students will walk away from the workshop with advanced drafts of their essays and well-crafted honors and activities sections for their Common Application. We have nine students who have signed up to participate in this week.


## Professional Development:

- Some of our high school teachers will be attending professional development in content areas over the summer. Mrs. Welch is attending a workshop in Mathematics, Mrs. Ledbetter is attending an Advanced Placement training for Biology, Mrs. Jacobs is attending an Advanced Placement course in Computer Science, and Mr. Kauder has been invited to attend a professional development opportunity through the Bill of Rights Institute.
- In grades 4-12 we are really digging into content and standards. Each department and grade level are examining and unpacking each of the content standards and are developing pacing guides that will incorporate these standards with their curriculum. We are really going to be taking this to the next level to make sure we are meeting our mission statement in each subject area and grade level. Mrs. Richardson is going to be leading this curriculum dive in grades 4-5 and I will be working with Middle and High school teachers throughout this summer to solidify our curriculum.

## - Special Awards and Recognitions:

- Our Robotics team has been invited to participate in The Maryland Tech Invitational from July 31st - August 1st. This is the largest off-season FTC tournament that brings together FTC teams from around the world. Only teams who have demonstrated excellence in engineering are invited to this highly competitive tournament. Only thirty-two teams are chosen for participation from hundreds of applicants. Selection is based on the team's proven performance through local and state tournaments, as well as a video submission of match play.
- We have had one of our seniors commit and sign with Cleveland Community College for Cross Country. We were able to have an athletic signing event that Mrs. Richardson planned for these four students, families, and guests on Thursday, May, 27th. We are very proud of Jackson Canipe and look forward to having more athletic signings in the future.


## - SeniorActivities

- Senior Week was a huge success, and it would not have been possible without the help and support of the PCA staff, parents, administrative team and board members. I appreciate all you did to help with these events and look forward to having another spectacular week in 2021.
- Looking to the future, I would like to begin an Alumni program that would perhaps be able to develop into an extension of PCA. We will now have two classes of students who have graduated and I would like to see our graduates involved in the school environment past graduation. This is very much in a developmental phase, but I am interested in any feedback or suggestions to help make this a successful program for the future of Pinnacle. My initial thoughts would be to include the past classes in the Homecoming event in the fall and another event (possibly senior week or Dr. Suess week) for the spring. I am in the process of collecting contact information for all of our graduates.
- I have been in contact with David Grose and Senior portraits will take place on July 14th and 15th. Information about the portrait sessions has gone out to parents and students. This will be the first senior activity for the Class of 2022!


## - Band Camp

- PCA will be hosting band camp for all beginning students the week of July 26th. Ms. Owens has developed a very detailed plan for the camp and I am excited to see our extracurricular activities be able to continue to flourish.

However, Bob Luddy is more than just a businessman, he is a champion for children's education and a school choice advocate.

In 1998, Bob established Franklin Academy, a public charter school in Wake Forest, which now serves over 1,200 K-12 students. In 2001, Bob founded St. Thomas More Academy, a private Catholic college preparatory high school in Raleigh. In 2007, Bob opened Thales Academy, a growing chain of independent Pre-K-12 schools offering high-quality education at an affordable tuition. The Luddy Schools are quickly growing, with nearly 3,000 students enrolled throughout the Raleigh area.
