New Hires for K-3

- K-3 Math Tutors- Keva Saunders and Hailey Haire have been hired to help tutor and supplement math instruction. They will focus on strengthening foundational skills that students need and are lacking.
- Math Tutoring began 9/27 for students.

Testing

• NC Check-In #1

- NC Check-In #1 for 3rd grade will be given the week of October 11-15.
- NC Check-Ins are interim assessments developed by the North Carolina Department of Public Instruction (NCDPI) that are aligned to North Carolina Standards.
- Third grade teachers have developed pacing guides to make sure the tested standards, especially in math, have been covered prior to the Check-In.

NC BOG Scores Fall 2021

- The NC BOG is given within the first 10 days of school. It establishes a baseline measure of beginning third-grade students' English language arts/reading skills. Students who score achievement level 3 or higher on the test demonstrate reading proficiency appropriate for third-grade students, which satisfies the requirements of the Read to Achieve legislation. Students in grade 3 who are not proficient on the EOG3 Reading Test but were proficient on the BOG3 Reading Test (i.e., score achievement level 3 or higher) count as proficient in the performance composite and school performance grades.
- Slight increase from the previous year: $23.6\% \rightarrow 25\%$ overall.
- The following table breaks down data by teacher.

Professional Learning Communities

- A professional learning community, or PLC, is a group of educators who come together regularly to learn with and from each other on needs they have identified.
- Miss McGinnis is meeting weekly with each grade level to discuss grade level needs and expectations along with focusing on data, grade level standards, iReady, pacing, and curriculum maps.

Beginning Teachers Program

• Beginning Teachers will meet on Thursday, October 7 at 3:45, in the gym. The focus will be classroom management. This topic is extremely important because without strong classroom management, learning cannot happen on the level that we expect, and students deserve.

4-12 Report to the Board of Directors Presented by Mrs. Angela Brooks

Action Items:

• Approve the Memorandum of Understanding between Cleveland Community College and Pinnacle Classical Academy as provided for the term of 2021-2026.

Wes Westmoreland asked to be recused prior to the start of Memorandum of Understanding between Cleveland Community College and Pinnacle Classical Academy due to being a Cleveland Community College Board of Trustee. Mr. Westmoreland was excused and left the teleconference.

The Board had an open discussion regarding the terms of the MOU to include guarantee of services from the Community College.

Dr. Pauline Cahill made a motion to approve the Memorandum of Understanding between Cleveland Community College and Pinnacle Classical Academy with the condition of continuing to search for guaranteed services. Betsy Harange seconded the motion, and the MOU was approved by the board.

After the discussion and vote concluded, Wes Westmoreland re-entered the teleconference.

Curriculum and Academics:

- Memorandum of Understanding between CCC and PCA is up for renewal. There are several changes as outlined in the provided document, but the largest change that will impact PCA is that CCC would like to start charging fees for our students to take their courses. The cost would be \$50.00 per student per course enrolled in. This will impact PCA's budget moving forward. This specific memorandum is capped at \$15,000, but I am sure the amount would increase as time goes on.
- We are working with upper middle school and high school teachers to assist with preparing students for National Exams such as SAT and ACT. Our English courses are beginning to integrate vocabulary, grammar, etc. in the English courses. Students are also using Khanacademy.com to help prepare on an individual level. We are excited to continue to

build our curriculum and make sure that we set our students up for success.

- 4-12 Data
 - Individual Data meetings are occurring. Mrs. Richardson, Mrs. Barnes, and I are meeting with 4-12 teachers in tested areas and reviewing EVAAS predictions. I feel the 4-12 team is dedicated to achieving the school goal of 85% this year and we are working on ways to achieve this goal.
 - In grades 4-6 we have started Math interventions with Title I money to help with our math goals in these grade levels. We have targeted Number and Operations and Algebraic thinking for the first round of tutoring and will continue to monitor students' progress in these areas.

• Senior Activities

- College Application Week is October 18th-22nd. Dr. Martin is working with the guidance counselors to promote College in all of our grade levels. Specifically, she is concentrating on assisting seniors in College Application Day on Tuesday, October, 19th.

Robert L. Luddy is a business and educational entrepreneur. A graduate of LaSalle University and a U.S. Army veteran, Luddy purchased a sheet metal shop in 1981 and transformed it into CaptiveAire Systems, leading manufacturer of commercial kitchen ventilation systems in North America. Today, CaptiveAire employs over 1000 employees, with 90 sales offices nationwide and sales over \$300 million in 2015. However, Bob Luddy is more than just a businessman, he is a champion for children's education and a school choice advocate.

In 1998, Bob established Franklin Academy, a public charter school in Wake Forest, which now serves over 1,200 K-12 students. In 2001, Bob founded St. Thomas More Academy, a private Catholic college preparatory high school in Raleigh. In 2007, Bob opened Thales Academy, a growing chain of independent Pre-K-12 schools offering high-quality education at an affordable tuition. The Luddy Schools are quickly growing, with nearly 3,000 students enrolled throughout the Raleigh area.




