• Overall in grades 4-8 we are making great progress. We are continuing to monitor this data and holding data meetings with our teachers. We are proud of the work the teachers and students have done so far this year and would like to see this continue to improve by the

next iReady diagnostic. We will continue to monitor this and begin to target 5th grade reading and 7th grade math. In addition we will really be focusing our efforts on math as well. Our goal is 88% proficiency.

Community Involvement:

• Cards and Supplies to Veterans at Christmas - 4th Grade - Ms. Cochran's Class o During the month of December Ms. Cochran's class is joining the PCA student body to collect donations and write Christmas cards for veterans in Bath VA Medical Center in Bath, New York. I think this is a very thoughtful way to give back to the community and am very grateful for Ms. Cochran's initiative in this project.

Extracurricular Activities:

• Pinnacle Classical Academy participated in the Shelby parade on Sunday, Dec. 18th. We rented a float for students who are involved in extracurricular activities to ride. Many students from our Robotics teams and cheer teams participated in the parade.

Special Awards and Recognitions:

- One of our seniors, David Briceno, has matched with Tufts University as a QuestBridge recipient. The National College Match is a college admission and scholarship process through which high-achieving, low-income students can be admitted early with full four-year scholarships to QuestBridge college partners. David is one of 1,755 students nationwide that was matched with one of the nation's best colleges. This is an excellent opportunity for David and we are very excited for him.
- Dale Harris is on track to be one of our first Career and Technical Education completers. He is expected to graduate this May with his welding technology certificate from Cleveland Community College. CCC has really worked well with PCA to make this happen for him and we are excited about this opportunity and our continued partnership.
- Ella Ledford, a ninth grader, is auditioning in ballet for the NC School of the Arts in February. Ella has performed in several ballets and we are hopeful to hear about her future acceptance.

- William Stockham, tenth grade student, is applying to the North Carolina School of Science and Mathematics. We are excited to see if he is accepted and wish him the best of luck.
- Daissy Soto, 11th grade, is Pinnacle's nominee for NC Governor's School for the 2022-23 school year. If selected Daissy will be able to participate in a four-week summer residential program for gifted and talented high school students, integrating academic disciplines, the arts, and unique courses on each of two campuses.
- Amy Brooks has received the <u>Lifeshape Scholarship</u> from North Greenville
 University. This scholarship will provide her with a full ride (tuition, room,
 meals, books/materials, and required fees. She is also a semifinalist for the <u>Levine Scholars Program</u> at UNC Charlotte. She will not continue to pursue the Levine Scholars Program, as she has now committed to North Greenville University.
- Lydia Canipe is a semi-finalist finalist for the Park Scholarship at NC State. There were over 3,400 applications for the Park Scholarship this year. Lydia will be interviewed on Saturday, Jan. 7th and we wish her the best of luck for this highly competitive program.
- Dr. Martin nominated several of our students for Clemson's C-Cats program. Clemson describes the program as follows: "Clemson's Challenge for Academically Talented Students (C-CATS) recruits top students from SC, NC and GA to participate in high-powered weekend retreats. Through team-building and

academic sessions, students gain leadership skills, make lasting friendships, and improve their ability to think clearly and perform under pressure, all while having the time of their lives!"

Classical Foundations Program (CFP) Update January 2, 2023

- 1. T. K. Coleman's monthly videos, based on the board's Values Statement, are shown each month to students in middle school and high school homerooms. In December, the theme was independent thought.
- 2. On December 9, Dr. Antony Davies (Duquesne University) and Dr. James Harrigan (American Institute for Economic Research) spoke to the grade 12 Rhetoric class on "Rhetoric and the Western Tradition." Their talk was well received several students spoke with them for ten minutes afterwards and each was then interviewed separately for *Dare to Soar*. They have expressed interest in teaching a course at PCA.
- 3. The Classical Foundation Program's spring 2023 lecturer recommended by

advisory board member Thomas Pack – is Albert Eisenberg, co-founder of the Philadelphia-based media company Broad+Liberty. He will speak on **Thursday**, **March 2**.

4. Mr. John Hood has agreed to be our 2023 graduation speaker on **Saturday**, **June** 3. His biography:

John Hood is president of the John William Pope Foundation, a Raleigh-based grantmaker that supports public policy organizations, educational institutions, arts and cultural programs, and humanitarian relief in North Carolina and beyond.

Hood also served as chairman of the board at the John Locke Foundation from 2015-2021. Hood helped found Locke in 1989 and served as its president from 1995 to 2014.

Since 1986, Hood has written a syndicated column on politics and public policy for North Carolina newspapers. It currently appears regularly in the *Winston-Salem Journal*, Greensboro *News & Record*, Asheville *Citizen-Times*, Wilmington *Star-News*, and newspapers in 50 other communities. Hood is a frequent commentator for radio and television stations and teaches at Duke University's Sanford School of Public Policy.

Hood is the author of eight books, the latest of which is a Revolutionary War-themed historical-fantasy novel entitled *Mountain Folk* (2021). Hood's other books include *Catalyst: Jim Martin and the Rise of North Carolina Republicans* (2015), *Our Best Foot Forward: An Investment Plan for North Carolina's Economic Recovery* (2012), *Selling the Dream: Why Advertising is Good Business* (2005), *Investor Politics* (2001), *The Heroic Enterprise: Business and the Common Good* (1996), and two volumes of family history.

A former Bradley Fellow at the Heritage Foundation, Hood writes and comments frequently for national media outlets. His articles have appeared in magazines such as *Readers' Digest*, *National Review*, *The New*

Republic, Military History, and Reason as well as newspapers such as The Wall Street Journal and USA Today.

At Locke, Hood created the E.A. Morris Fellowship for Emerging Leaders, which prepares young North Carolinians for leadership roles in the public and private sectors. He also serves on the faculty and as board chairman of the N.C. Institute of Political Leadership; as co-chair of the North Carolina Leadership Forum, based at Duke University; as vice-chair of the James G. Martin Center for Academic Renewal and the Carolina Liberty Foundation; and on the boards of directors of the State Policy Network, the Student Free Press Association, and North Carolinians for Redistricting Reform.

Hood received his B.A. in journalism from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill. He earned a M.A. in liberal studies and a graduate certificate in nonprofit management from UNC-Greensboro. Hood currently serves on the UNC-Chapel Hill Board of Visitors. He is a Mecklenburg County native and currently resides in Wake County with his wife, two sons, and a stepdaughter.

Sen. Westmoreland and Mr. Ziegler offered an update on the progress of Pinnacle Classical Academy and the Classical Foundations Program, including the 2022 graduation, an historical perspective on the school's test scores, the paying off of the elementary school loan, the archery state championships, and the school's 10th anniversary year.

Following a discussion of upcoming appearances by T. K. Coleman and a speaker from the Ayn Rand Institute (on the novel *Anthem*), members unanimously elected Sen. Westmoreland the 2022-23 chairman (motion by Matthew Morgen, seconded by Adam Smith). Members then discussed the spring 2023 Classical Foundations Program speaker and heard an update on a prospective board member.


