Below is the end of year projected proficiency percentages. Historically, iReady is an excellent tool that aligns well with EVAAS data from the state. Our teachers rely on this data heavily as they adjust instruction, particularly this time of year before EOG testing.

Curriculum and Academics:

- We will be entering exam month beginning in May. We have many AP Exams scheduled for the first couple of weeks in May and then final exams will begin on May 15th. Teachers are busy reviewing for these exams and we are excited to see the results soon.
- Registration is being finished up with students in rising 9th through 12th grades. Dr. Martin completed the registration process with students in rising 11th-12th grades and Mrs. Welch and myself completed the process for students in grades 9 and 10. Parent contact has been made in regards to student choices and individual meetings have occurred as needed or requested. We will be in contact with our new PCA families to begin the process of getting them registered as well.
- As of April 25th, it looks as though we will have 31 (78%) students graduating with either their Associate in Science or Associates in Arts Degree as well as their high school diploma. In addition, we have two students who have completed the Business Administration Certificate, and eleven students who have finished the Biotech certificate. In addition to our seniors, we have 4 juniors who have also completed certificates this year as well. Three of those are in collision repair and the other is in IT. The CCC Commencement Ceremony will be on Thursday, May 15th at 6:00 at Cleveland Community College. We have many of our students that are going to participate in that ceremony and we look forward to celebrating with them.
- Of the 40 anticipated graduates 93% of the Class of 2025 has received some college credit either through Advanced Placement classes or through Cleveland Community College. This is a wonderful opportunity for our students and will be beneficial as many of them continue additional educational opportunities upon graduation.

K-8 STEM Instruction Overview Report to the Board Curriculum Chair (March 31, 2025 email) Reprinted for the Board May 2025

Our STEM classes through the eighth grade have historically been one quarter (approximately nine weeks) in length. The one structural change that has taken place in recent years has been driven by the state's new computer science graduation requirement: it may be fulfilled anytime in grades 6-12, but the required course must be one semester in length, rather than a quarter. The requirement can be met in various ways -- "STEM requirement" might have been a better name for the requirement than "computer science" -- and the new graduation requirement is in addition to, and separate from, the state's science and math graduation requirements.

In order to meet the new requirement without impacting grade 9-12 classes, we lengthened grade 8 STEM from one quarter to one semester by eliminating the one-quarter grade 8 music course. In turn, we eliminated the one-quarter grade 7 STEM course and lengthened music to one semester. Students receive the same amount of STEM instruction as before, and the same amount of music instruction as before, but these courses are packaged differently so that our students are able to meet the new state computer science requirement.

Some of our high school electives -- AP Computer Science A, Honors Computer Science, and Honors Robotics -- also meet the new state requirement. Students who enter PCA in grade 9 or beyond without

having met the new state requirement must take one of these courses.

middle school

Mr. Buhaiov is currently using the **Project STEM** curriculum in his middle school STEM classes.

In grade 6, he is able to cover some (but not all) of the material in the Fundamentals in Scratch course over the course of a quarter. Here is Project STEM's description of what he is able to cover:

- Getting Started and Motion in Scratch: Block A provides students with an introduction to computer science, computing, and programming, and the foundational knowledge to begin using the Scratch programming tool. Students are introduced to the Scratch programming environment and key blocks used to program events and responses in Scratch. Through projects focused on computing concepts focused on driving motion, students will develop familiarity using Scratch and begin to understand wide-reaching principles of computer science and its applicability to other fields of study.
- Animation and Games: Block B builds on students' foundational knowledge from Block A, to introduce them to additional creative ways of using computer science. Students are introduced to the concepts of programming loops and conditionals through block-based Scratch projects that investigate animation and game design.

In grade 8, he covers the entirety of the Creative CS curriculum. Here is Project STEM's description of what he is covering:

- Getting Started and CS in App Design: Block A provides students with an introduction to computer science, computing, programming, programming languages and the foundational knowledge to begin using the App Lab programming tool. Students are introduced to the App Lab programming environment and key blocks used to program app interfaces, events and responses. Through independent activities, group explorations, and class discussions, students will learn about trending careers in app design and real world industry practices, as well as advance their programming knowledge.
- CS and LED Art with Micro:bit: In Block B, students will explore computer science concepts and gain familiarity with Python by programming a virtual microcomputer the Micro:bit. Students will learn to use code to control the output of the 25 individual LEDs that make up the unit's 5x5 grid while expanding their knowledge of key CS and programming concepts.
- CS and Music with Earsketch: Block C familiarizes students with the Earsketch platform for creating music with code. Through this platform they will be able to review their knowledge of Python and CS concepts while learning about music production and CS in the music industry. Students will extend their knowledge of programming by writing their own functions in Python which they will use to structure their own musical compositions.

grades K-5

Our longtime grade K-5 STEM teacher, now a grade 3 teacher, passed along her <u>lesson plans</u> to our current grade K-3 teacher, as well as to the interim teacher who is our grade 4-5 STEM teacher. Our longtime teacher aligned many of her lessons with other parts of the elementary school curriculum, and I am grateful that she passed along her lessons.

Each grade in the grade K-5 Core Knowledge Science curriculum has six or seven units. The classroom teacher covers all the science units except for the computer science unit, which is covered in STEM

class. Here is Core Knowledge's overview of its computer science strand:

• Core Knowledge Science has a unique strand associated with its core science program—Computer Science. Each grade level, K–5, has one unit devoted to computer science education. The topics are grade-level appropriate and have been informed by the Computer Science Teachers Association standards. Students learn about computers in our world, safe computer use online, and learn how computers can be programmed to do tasks to help develop an efficient society.

Our current K-3 teacher mentioned to Mrs. Jackson that in addition to using her predecessor's lesson plans and the Core Knowledge units, she has incorporated additional materials. She recommends that in the future, K-3 STEM instruction have more of a typing component (she suggests <u>TypeTastic</u>) as well as a robotics component.

Classical Foundations Program (CFP) Update May 2025

1. Students in middle school and high school watch a brief presentation each month by T.K. Coleman; each presentation is devoted to one of the school's ten values. May's theme is pride. As discussed in the school's values statement:

1. Key Changes Being Proposed

New Administrative Roles

■ Chief Education Officer: Dr. Shelly Shope- The CEO will serve as the direct contact for Pinnacle Classical Academy and partner to the school's Headmaster and Administrative Team; manage the operational budget, ensuring effective fiscal stewardship and sustainability for the organization; provide compliance oversight, understand and manage charter school law, policy, and protocols. Strategic leadership and planning, Support the Board's strategic planning process by proposing relevant priorities and implementing key annual action plans that align with the Board's vision; Foster a true sense of loyalty within the school by working with the Administrative Team to create a trusting, collaborative,

open, and positive atmosphere amongst staff; Reinforce the Board's governance by participating in monthly board meetings, preparing monthly administrative reports, and developing recommendations for board consideration that combine the best interests of students and the needs of PCA with the focus and direction the Board desires.

- *Headmaster:* Mrs. Angela Brooks The Headmaster will lead and be responsible for academics, curriculum, and instruction. The Headmaster will supervise and observe all instructional practices including coaching and mentoring either directly or through other assigned staff, and hire, evaluate, and terminate staff in conjunction with the CEO.


